


In Memoriam

WILLIAM O'DRISCOLL, MD

Dr. William "Bill" O'Driscoll passed away on August 26, 2013. He studied medicine and graduated from the University of Cork in Ireland, immigrating to the US after meeting his future wife, Mary, at a hospital in Philadelphia on a long term visit. After serving as a Captain in the US Army Medical Corps in post-war Japan, Dr. O'Driscoll specialized in Internal Medicine at Henry Ford Hospital and set up practice in Grand Rapids. He was a dedicated supporter of St. Mary's Hospital, serving at various times as Chairman of the Internal Medicine Department, as Chief of Staff and as Vice President of Medical Affairs.

PAUL VAN PORTFLIET, MD

Dr. Paul Van Portfliet passed away on September 14, 2013. He was a graduate of the University of Michigan Medical School in Ann Arbor, Ml. Dr. Van Portfliet served his country as a Captain in the United States Army in post-World War II Germany and returned to complete his residency training in Ophthalmology at the University of Michigan. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Background Information



In 1965 President Lyndon Johnson signed Medicare and Medicaid into law, and Medicare Parts A and B were implemented in 1966. At that time the physician reimbursement was the usual, reasonable and customary fees paid for the service.

> In 1972 President Richard Nixon signed a law that dramatically expanded Medicare benefits. In 1977 President Jimmy Carter created the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) that later became the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). In 1985 President Ronald Reagan signed a law that created funds directed to Harvard to develop a resources based relative value scale to be used as a guide to reimburse physicians. In 1988 Harvard submitted the RBRVS plan to HCFA. In 1989 President George H.W. Bush signed OBRA 1989 enacting physician payment based on "resources used", the RBRVS. On January 1, 1992 the Harvard RBRVS system was implemented and fees went down. In 1995 private insurers started to adopt the structure of the RBRVS. In 1996 President Bill Clinton signed a law for Resource Based "Practice Expense". In 2010 President Barack Obama signed PPACA the Affordable Care Act or "Obama Care".

> "Results, Potential Effects and Implementation of the Resource-Based Relative Value Scale" By William Hsiao, PhD, and Peter Braun, M.D. was published in JAMA on October 28, 1988, Vol. 260, No. 16. The goals stated in the article were to "standardize payments, rationalize incentives and influence physician decisions", to "provide a neutral incentive structure", and to "enhance cost effectiveness and ameliorate manpower shortage in primary care".

> What we as physicians are paid by CMS for Medicare patients, is determined by four components of a

formula. 1) RVU "physician work", 2) RVU "practice expense", 3) RVU "medical liability insurance" and 4) GPCI "our geographic location".

Payment = (work RVU + practice expense RVU + professional liability insurance RVU) x GPCl x conversion factor. The physician work RVU takes into consideration the relative level of time, skill, training and intensity to provide a given service. Each CPT code has a unique physician RVU and practice expense RVU. The conversion factor is a dollar multiplier used by CMS to attain budget neutrality, and is updated annually according to a formula specified by statute. Congress has the ability to override the formula, as it has done in the past several years. This formula is even more complicated when you add in the differing pay rates for the different facilities. In hospital, outpatient or in office procedures have different practice expense RVU's, hospitals generally are higher.

CMS payments for surgeries have actually declined significantly and is even worse when adjusted for inflation. In my specialty, for instance, a transurethral resection of a medium bladder tumor (CPT code 52235) was reimbursed \$689 in 1990 (which would be \$1,214 in 2013 when adjusted for inflation), and is \$283 today, a change of -77%, radical nephrectomy down 62%, radical retropubic prostatectomy down 61%, and the list goes on, and is generalizable to just about all specialties.

Regardless of the employment model of physicians the SGR affects all of us in our ability to pay the bills to keep the doors open and see patients, and hopefully you will be open to a suggestion when the time comes to contact your senator or congressman about the repeal of the SGR. There is renewed interest in its' repeal, perhaps as early as January.

Leave a Legacy





Always Think Pink for Women in Kent County

It is not uncommon these days to turn on the television on a Saturday or Sunday afternoon to watch a football game and see the color pink accenting the traditional colors of your favorite college or NFL team. Locally, many high schools are following the lead of Lowell High School and are sporting entire pink uniforms for one game each season.

> As we all know, wearing the color pink is a means to show support for women with breast cancer and raise awareness and funds for the continued battle against a disease that impacts hundreds of thousands of women each year across the United States. Although October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, healthcare providers should "think pink" during each encounter with their female patients to aid in the early diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer.

> In 2010, 405 women in Kent County were diagnosed with breast cancer and 71 lost their life to this disease. Although adult women can be diagnosed with breast cancer at any age, nearly one-third of women in Kent County are diagnosed between the ages of 60 and 74. While nearly 3 of every 4 women are diagnosed at the in situ or localized stage, 1 of every 4 is diagnosed with regional or distant metastases. Figure 1 presents 3-year age-adjusted breast cancer incidence rates by race for Kent County females. The overall breast cancer incidence rate has increased slightly since 2005-2007 and there is indication that the incidence rate is greater in White women compared to

African American women. Conversely, the breast cancer mortality rate of African American women is greater than that of White women and is increasing while that of White women is declining (Figure 2).

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention indicate that African American women are 40% more likely to die of breast cancer than White women. Factors that contribute to this difference include the following:

- African American women often have cancers that grow faster and are harder to treat.
- African American women often have fewer social and economic resources than other women.
- African American women are less likely to get prompt follow-up care when their mammogram shows something that is not normal.
- African American women are less likely to get high-quality treatment if they have cancer.

Healthcare providers can help their patients get breast cancer screening and care by:

REMINDING PATIENTS OF THEIR APPOINTMENTS

Have the office staff remind your patients of their upcoming appointments. Track the progress of patients who need follow-up tests or treatment to make sure they get the care they need. If possible, assign a patient navigator.

EXPLAINING RISKS

Talking with each patient about her risk of breast cancer, the benefits and risks of mammograms, and the right age to start getting mammograms. Tell her where she can get a mammogram done. Don't forget some women may not be able to afford a mammogram. If the mammogram shows something that is not normal, explain the next set of tests. Answer all of her questions.

ACTING QUICKLY

Getting test results quickly and calling your patients right away. If needed, refer them to the next test or doctor right away.

The Kent County Women's Health Network (WHN) offers free mammograms and clinical breast exams to women who qualify. Follow-up, referrals and treatment are also provided for qualifying WHN participants.


To qualify for services, women must meet the following criteria based on their income and family size:

- Have an income <250% of federal poverty level.
- Be uninsured: Medicare. Medicaid and most HMOs pay for yearly mammograms. If a patient has insurance that does not cover these services, she may qualify for other community programs and resources and WHN can assist with these referrals.
- Be age 40-64 for breast cancer screening and diagnostic follow-up of breast abnormalities


3-year age-adjusted breast cancer incidence rates by race, Kent County 2000-2010



Plan Now for ICD-10 Conversion in 2014

The Department of Health and Human Services delayed the implementation deadline for ICD-10 from October 1, 2013 to October 1, 2014. That being said, we as healthcare professionals should not delay in creating a strategic plan for this conversion from ICD-9 to ICD-10.

Additionally, we will need to be prepared to run a dual diagnostic coding program in our offices if we accept Workers compensation and Auto insurances. Both of these payors are exempt from this mandate and will continue to use ICD-9 coding format.

ICD-10 shifts the code structure and format. With that comes more than 140,000 new codes, focusing on specificity. This is going to be an enormous amount of work for our medical practices and with that comes a large expense. We cannot focus on the downside of this change and sit idly by hoping for another delay. From all that we hear, this is going to happen, whether we are ready or not. This author's opinion is that we are always better off being fully prepared and ready to embrace the new initiatives. With this mindset, it helps our practice to improve in many ways and eliminates the stress and fear of the unknown. So, don't wait. You have one year to prepare for this and those who are ready will be far more fortunate than those who hoped it would go away.

A very good friend and colleague of mine shared his ICD-10 Transition plan with me recently. I have revised it to meet our practice needs and have included it in this article for you to review and take from it what you need to help your practice move forward in preparing for the ICD-10 mandate.

I wish you the best with this and the many changes we all will be facing in healthcare over the next few years. I encourage you to engage your leadership team and provide them with the tools they will need and I would encourage them to join Michigan Medical Group Management Association (MMGMA). MMGMA will be there to help with the educational and peer to peer support that will be priceless during this ICD-10 mandate and all the challenges (opportunities) we have ahead.

ICD-10 Transition 2013 Individual Practice Preparation:

- 1. Create an ICD-10 Project Management Team
- 2. Review ICD-10 Resources Available to you

- 3. Inform colleagues/staff of anticipated change
- 4. Develop and complete an ICD-10 project for your practice
 - · Identify each task, deadline and individual responsible
 - · Develop a plan for communicating with staff and business partners about ICD-10
 - Estimate and establish a budget: including potential costs to update practice management systems, new coding guides & superbills, and staff training
 - · Ask your payers and vendors (software/systems, clearinghouses, billing services) about their ICD-10 preparation and readiness. Review contracts and proposals

- Inquire as to systems changes, timelines, costs, and testing plans
- Inquire as to when they will begin testing, how long it will take, and how you will be involved
- Review/discuss changes in clinical documentation requirements and educate staff by reviewing frequently used ICD-9 codes and new ICD-10 codes.

Anticipate/Expect to continue testing transactions and fine-tuning your transition up to the ICD-10 compliance date of October 1, 2014. CMS Website is www.cms.gov/ICD10.

Fall Update

At the College of Human Medicine, October means that fourth-year students are in the thick of the residency application process. Even the main stream media has reported on the growing number of medical students and the stable number of training positions.

> This has resulted in the process becoming more competitive for medical students year after year. The application cycle has become compressed during the past two years, with the electronic residency application service (ERAS) releasing student applications to residency programs September 15, followed on October 1 by the submission of the Medical Student Performance Evaluation (MSPE, formerly known as the Dean's Letter) by medical schools. Depending on the specialty, students typically apply to 20-80 or more programs, with the hope of getting 10-20 interviews and ranking that many programs in February in order to get that one perfect spot on Match Day in March! This year, Grand Rapids students are applying to a wide variety of specialties, with the greatest numbers entering Emergency Medicine, Internal Medicine, and Pediatrics.

> This fall, the College of Human Medicine is preparing for its accreditation site visit in the fall of 2014. Many clinical, basic science, and research faculty and staff, as well as some of our community physicians across all of our campuses are spending hours collecting and analyzing data as part of our institutional self-study. In looking at the largest portion of our database, related to Educational Programs, I am struck by how much of our programming involves collaboration and cooperation with our community

partners and physicians. We are fortunate to have so many research mentors, volunteer faculty, medical office staff, and interprofessional partners who contribute to the richness of our program. As part of our report, we will be showcasing the strengths of all of our communities, as well as our growing research enterprise, our student services, faculty, and educational resources.

On September 23, the College of Human Medicine launched a new Rural Community Health Program in Northern Michigan with Charlevoix Area Hospital, McLaren Northern Michigan, and Alpena Regional Medical Center. Each education site includes a rural hospital, the surrounding medical communities, and the local public health department.

GRMEP graduate Andrea Wendling, now a family physician in Northern Michigan and associate professor at the College of Human Medicine is director of the Rural Community Health Program. To her, the program offers a unique opportunity for students to experience rural medicine, a focus not often found in medical school. She hopes this exposure leads students to consider the rewarding medical career path of rural medicine.

"We have wonderful health care providers and practices in place up here," Wendling said. "We just need to attract future rurally minded physicians so that all communities can benefit. This program is a great place to start."

The college looks to expand this program to other rural communities in the state. Stay tuned.
