In Memoriam

GERALD F. BAROFSKY, MD

Dr. Barofsky passed away on January 31, 2013. He was a graduate of the University of Michigan Medical School and practiced family medicine in Grand Rapids for 25 years. He also served as the Kent County Medical Examiner for many years. Dr. Barofsky then joined the army and practiced family medicine at Madigan Army Hospital in Tacoma, Washington as a Lieutenant Colonel for ten more years. He was a World War II veteran and was in the United States Navy from 1943 until 1946, serving on an LST (Landing Ship Tank) in the South Pacific.

DAVID C. BOYCE, MD

Dr. Boyce passed away on Tuesday, March 5, 2013. He obtained his medical degree from the University of Wisconsin; he interned at Indiana University, and did his Ophthalmology residency at the University of Iowa. He served in the U.S. Navy during World War II as a medical officer on LST (Landing Ship Tank) 347 during the June 1944 Normandy invasion. Dr. Boyce practiced medicine and surgery in Grand Rapids from 1950 through 1998. He continued doing volunteer office ophthalmology practice at the Saint Mary's Heartside Clinic for several years.

ROBERT D. BURTON, MD

Dr. Burton passed away on February 15, 2013. He attended University of Michigan Medical School and completed his residency in Otolaryngology. He did his internship at Saint Mary's Hospital and lived in Grand Rapids for over 50 years. Dr. Burton served as a Michigan Delegate to the AMA, President of the Kent County Medical Society, and President of the Michigan State Medical Society.

LUEBERT DOCTER, MD

Dr. Docter passed away January 20, 2013. He graduated from University of Cincinnati Medical School in 1940 and interned at St. Vincent's Hospital in Toledo, OH. Dr. Docter was a veteran of World War II and served in the US Army Medical Corps as Medical Officer of the 102nd medical battalion assigned to the 27th Infantry Division, Pacific Theater in the battles of Eniwetok, Saipan and Okinawa. He survived two Bonsai attacks and was awarded the bronze star for medical combat duty. After certification in ophthalmology, Dr. Docter practiced in Grand Rapids for 35 years.

EDWARD Y. POSTMA, MD

Dr. Postma passed away on January 9, 2013. He graduated from the University of Michigan Medical School in 1940 and completed his internship and residency in Obstetrics and Gynecology at Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids. Dr. Postma served in the U.S. Army during World War II as a commanding officer in the infantry and medical corps.

ROBERT TROSKE, MD

Dr. Troske passed away on February 27, 2013. He entered the Army after receiving his medical degree from the University of Michigan Medical School in 1955. His postings and training took Dr. Troske and his family from Texas to California to Alabama before retiring from the Army as a Major in 1964 and returning to Grand Rapids to open a medical practice.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Fostering Leadership

Last month I was honored to speak to many interested students from the Michigan State University-College of Human Medicine about what the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA) would mean to them. There were about 70 students, mostly first and second year medical students, my co-speaker and a sprinkling of faculty in attendance.

> It is difficult to put together a talk on the ACA to these future doctors many of whom have never heard of a CPT Code, ICD 9 and the crosswalk to ICD 10, RBRVS, the SGR, IPAB, and a host of other TLA's and FLA's (Three Letter Acronyms and

Four Letter Acronyms). But, we did the best we could and hopefully we did not scare them out of medicine into a dentistry program. After the talk, one of the organizers of the event, a second-year student, asked me if we had any ideas on how to develop leadership in the young, soon-to-be physicians. We certainly encourage physician involvement at the level of the county, state and national medical societies, but we do not have anything formal.

She started me thinking, though. I am a graduate of the American Urological Associations (AUA) Young Leadership Inaugural Class. During the two years of study, urologists from around the United States were introduced to the various departments of the AUA including the Office of Education, Quality, Research, and my favorite committees: Socio-Economic and Reimbursement. There is no reason that the Kent County Medical Society could not foster leadership within the membership. So to that end, I invite any interested physician, in practice or in residency, or medical student to let me know if they have a desire to become leaders in organized medicine and I will make every

effort to accomplish that outcome.

During one of my "Hill Visits" to Washington, D.C., Congress passed the ACA. At that time it was 2,100 pages long and you could read it over a weekend. Now the package has ballooned to over 20,000 pages. Our society recently co-sponsored an evening presentation to explain the basics of the Affordable Care Act and what kind of impact this will have on our practices. Whether in solo private practice, group private practice, or one of the various types

of employed models of practice, information of extreme value was delivered that evening. One piece of information presented was what will be needed in order to qualify for Medicaid. It is unbelievable to expect Medicaid recipients to fill out a 23-page form without help. This application will be submitted to several different departments including the IRS, to determine the financial

that outcome.

eligibility of the applicant, and the Department of State, to determine whether the applicant is a citizen of the United States. Health and Human Services (HHS) was to develop a state of the art computer system to be used to administer much of the ACA by 2014. The Secretary of HHS was recently overheard saying something like "Don't hold your breath". We, however, will continue to hold informative meetings to keep our members up to date on the ACA.

The Kent County Medical Society has several committees one of which reviews proposed Michigan legislation and regulations. We routinely host local state senators and representatives at the meetings to inform them of our views and educate them on the possible (unintended) consequences of the bills before them. We represent ALL physicians. There are times when we may call upon you to send an email to your congressman about a particularly urgent issue before the state house. I hope you will respond. If you would like to help with organized medicine, we could always use your time and talents on committees, the Board of Directors, and/or at the House of Delegates.

GET INVOLVED! KCMS Commitees

EDITORIAL COMMITTEE

Function: To review editorial content and to review the layout and design of the Bulletin. Assist the KCMS Staff with edits of the quarterly magazine, the Bulletin, via email and phone.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

Function: To be patient advocates and to educate area legislators of the effects of proposed legislation on the practice of medicine. The committee meets at Noon on the 2nd Monday of most months and welcomes involvement by elected officials every other month.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

Function: The Membership Committee shall review all applications for membership, make recommendations of membership to the Board of Directors, have responsibility for retaining members, and conduct an orientation of new members. Members work with KCMS staff by emailed document transfers and phone calls.

PEER REVIEW COMMITTEE

Function: The Peer Review Committee shall hear and review all matters pertaining to problems between complainants and members of this Society which shall be brought before it in writing, or in person and subsequently reduced to writing. The committee meets as needed.

PROGRAM/CME COMMITTEE

Function: The Program Committee shall be responsible for the speakers and the Society's scientific programs which are held two to three times annually. Members assist in recruiting speakers, identifying current topics for consideration and reviewing the makeup of each CME event (usually eight 30-minute speakers).

RESOLUTION 52-13

Title: Changing Language in **Psychiatric Certifications.** By: David W. Whalen, MD, MPH

RESOLVED: That MSMS work with the State of Michigan Probate Court to find language that would allow a Clinical Certification to be filled out

on a patient on whom a medical screening exam was performed pursuant to compliance with the Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act (EMTALA) and prior to the certification statement being read to the patient.

Rationale: The Committee agrees with the author of this resolution that compliance with this clinical certification requirement is unworkable. Furthermore, the resolution appears to be a reasonable approach toward trying to address the problem perceived by the author. The Committee is therefore supportive of this effort.

RESOLUTION 54-13

Title: Amend Physician Assistant Supervision Regulations. REFERRED TO THE BOARD FOR STUDY. By: David E. Hammond, MD

RESOLVED: That MSMS support legislation to amend Michigan's Public Health Code to limit the number of mid-level providers practicing in private offices, clinics, and hospitals that a physician is allowed to mentor/monitor no more than two (2) mid-level providers per physician.

Rationale: The Committee heard a great deal of testimony on the appropriate use of physician assistants and advance practicing nurses. While many of the specific concerns on the part of physicians with respect to the use of mid level providers varied, the recurring theme was the importance of appropriate physician supervision. The Committee believes that referral to the MSMS board is the best option so that additional study can be conducted to come up with a more comprehensive policy with respect to the use of physician assistants.

RESOLUTION 57-13

Title: Voting Rights for Patients with Dementia. REFERRED TO THE BOARD FOR STUDY. By: Jayne E. Courts, MD

RESOLVED: That MSMS review current state voting laws and present legislation mandating that patients who have been declared legally incompetent to manage their finances and their medical care be prohibited from voting in all local, state, and national elections; and be it further



RESOLVED: That MSMS work with the Michigan Secretary of State to arrange physician reporting of patients who have been declared legally incompetent to manage their finances and their medical care with subsequent removal of these patient names from the statewide qualified voter list; and be it further

RESOLVED: That MSMS provide education to physicians about any new requirement to report patients who have been declared legally incompetent to manage their finances and their medical care to the Michigan Secretary of State.

Note: The Committee recommended disapproval based on the rationale below. The Resolution was extracted and the HOD voted to refer Resolution 57-13 to the Board for study.

Rationale: The Committee believes that the author raises an interesting point about the potential for patients with dementia to be taken advantage of by family members or caregivers. However, the Committee was not sure if this is an appropriate role for physicians. Competency is a legal term determined by a judge, so it was not clear to the Committee if a physician should breach patient confidentiality to report to the Secretary of State. Unlike the reporting of impaired drivers, voters do not pose an immediate risk to the public raising further questions about the appropriateness of breaching patient confidentiality. The Committee did not agree with the author that the inability to manage finances or medical care necessarily means that individuals would be incapable of making the decisions required to vote.

RESOLUTION 58-13

Title: Cost of Interpretive Services for Hearing Impaired Patients. ADOPTED.

By: Donald P. Condit, MD, MBA

RESOLVED: That MSMS advocate for an amendment to Michigan law, seeking reimbursement for physicians for the cost of interpretive services for hearing impaired patients.

Rationale: The Committee is familiar with scenarios whereby the costs associated with a translator easily surpasses the amount paid by the insurer for the care delivered by the physician. The Committee agrees with the intent and wording of this resolution.

RESOLUTION 59-13

Title: Violence and Mental Illness. ADOPTED. By: Donald P. Condit, MD, MBA

RESOLVED: That MSMS either reconvene the Mental Health Committee, or establish a task force of qualified members, to develop an advocacy plan to promote public safety and improve treatment for individuals whom physicians consider at risk of violence due to mental illness in Michigan.

RESOLUTION 60-13

Title: Modification of MSMS Policy regarding Michigan Certificate of Need. ADOPTED. By: Phillip G. Wise, MD

RESOLVED: That MSMS policy be changed to state that MSMS supports repeal of Certificate Need legislation and repeal of Certificate of Need Standards, specifically those addressing physician ownership of or investments in ambulatory surgery centers, rudimentary or advanced imaging centers, extracorporeal shockwave lithotripsy, laboratories, and advanced radiotherapy treatment centers

Rationale: This resolution seeks to alter the existing policy of MSMS in support of the repeal of the Certificate of Need (CON) law in Michigan by clarifying that this could mean the outright repeal of CON or individual standards or services within the CON process. The Committee believes that the changes in this resolution provide greater flexibility for MSMS to pursue changes to the CON law into the future.

RESOLUTION 61-13

Title: Clarification of State of Michigan Smoke Free Workplace Laws. ADOPTED. By: R. Paul Clodfelder, MD

RESOLVED: That MSMS investigate whether the Smoke Free Workplace Laws of 2010 apply to marijuana smoke, and if not, work with the legislature to amend those laws to include this substance.

Rationale: Currently, it appears that the Ron Davis, MD, Smoke Free Workplace Law and the Michigan Medical Marijuana Act (MMA) provide appropriate prohibitions on smoking in public places. However, should there be any changes to the MMA or should marijuana be decriminalized, the Ron Davis, MD, Smoke Free Workplace Law would only apply to tobacco products. This resolution is worded in such a way that this can provide appropriate direction for MSMS to assure the intent of the smoke free air statute is preserved into the future.



RESOLUTION 62-13

Title: Exchange of Peer Review Material among Medical Entities. ADOPTED AS AMENDED.

By: Brian A. Roelof, MD

RESOLVED: That the MSMS Board of Directors in consultation and collaboration with their attorneys and hospital associates evaluate current Michigan Peer Review statutes to determine if we can better: 1. Promote peer review activity,

2. Share peer review information between all medical entities in the state of Michigan; and be it further

RESOLVED: That MSMS reaffirm and promote peer review activity; and be it

RESOLVED: That MSMS reaffirm the need to continue strict peer review confidentiality; and be it further

RESOLVED: That MSMS study the advantages and pitfalls of the exchange of peer review information between medical entities and report the findings and any recommendations to the 2014 House of Delegates.

Rationale: The Committee accepted the author's friendly amendment to change the fourth "Whereas" to "Resolved" to clarify the intent of the resolution. The first resolved was removed because it was duplicative of the "Whereas.

RESOLUTION 63-13

Title: Observation Status and Medicare Part A Qualification. ADOPTED AS AMENDED. By: Jayne E. Courts, MD

RESOLVED: That our AMA seek and/ or support a requirement that a 72 hour hospital stay, either under inpatient status or under observation status, will qualify a patient for Medicare Part A coverage for . skilled services after discharge.

Rationale: The Committee added a friendly amendment to change the wording from "pursue" to "seek and/or support." They also removed the "legal" requirement to support other means of resolving the stated problem.

RESOLUTION 64-13

Title: Electronic Health Record Penalties: Taxation without Representation? ADOPTED. By: Jayne E. Courts, MD

RESOLVED: That our AMA work to have all federal penalties tied to the use of Electronic Health Records (EHRs) revoked as yet another form of unfair financial penalty for physicians.

RESOLUTION 65-13

Title: Hyperbaric Oxygen **Chamber Accreditation.** REFERRED TO THE BOARD **FOR STUDY** By: Jayne E. Courts, MD/ Richard J. Hodgson, MD

RESOLVED: That MSMS work with the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs, Bureau of Health Systems, to mandate that all hyperbaric oxygen chambers in the state of Michigan be fully accredited on a regular basis to improve patient and staff safety; and be it

RESOLVED: That MSMS work with the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs, Bureau of Health Systems, to mandate that all hyperbaric oxygen chambers in the state of Michigan be available 24/7, seven days a week, for emergency care of patients as a requirement for accreditation; and be it further

RESOLVED: That our AMA work with the Undersea and Hyperbaric Medicine Society (UHMS), which in collaboration with The Joint Commission serves as the accreditation agency for hyperbaric oxygen chambers, to mandate that all hyperbaric oxygen chambers be fully accredited on a regular basis to improve patient and staff safety; and be it further

RESOLVED: That our AMA work with the Undersea and Hyperbaric Medicine Society (UHMS) to require that all hyperbaric oxygen chambers be available 24/7, seven days a week, for emergency care of patients as a requirement for accreditation.

Rationale: The Committee reviewed testimony provided to them along with information from the Undersea and Hyperbaric Medicine Society on the accreditation process provided to facilities and employees associated with hyperbaric chambers. The Committee learned that in the state. 40 chambers are in operation with only two being available 24/7. The Committee agrees with the accreditation of the chambers, but finds that they have several questions surrounding the accreditation process. The Committee heard there are three levels of accreditation that already exist with only the first levels addressing 24/7 operations. The Committee believes that requiring all chambers to be Level 1 accredited is not feasible, but the current statute does not meet the needs of Michigan's citizens. There was no information given to the Committee on the distribution of the current facilities. It was the determination of the Committee there were so many unanswered questions, but that this is a substantive issue. Therefore, it was the recommendation of the Committee to refer this resolution to the Board for further study.

RESOLUTION 66-13

Title: Increasing Post-Graduate Medical Education Slots in the State of Michigan. REAFFIRMED. By: Patrick J. Droste, MS, MD

RESOLVED: That MSMS work with the State of Michigan and the federal government to increase funding from private and federal sources for post graduate residency training in the State of

Rationale: After review of the resolution and MSMS policy, it was determined that MSMS has addressed this issue in the past and has existing policy.

Title: Increase Funding for Post-Graduate Education. REAFFIRMED. By: Patrick J. Droste, MS, MD





Can You Spot a Case of Measles?

Measles is a highly communicable viral disease. Fortunately, as a result of vaccination, the United States achieved measles elimination (defined as interruption of year-round endemic measles transmission) in the year 2000 and reported cases of measles are relatively rare. Nationally, on average, 60 people are reported to have measles each year.

> In 2011, an uncharacteristic total of 222 cases and 17 outbreaks were reported nationwide with 90% of cases associated with importations from other countries. In Michigan, there have been only 17 confirmed cases of measles reported since the year 2000. January 2013 saw the first reported case of measles in Kent County since 1999. This rare occurrence in Kent County provided a good reminder of the importance of the public health response to even a single case of measles and the critical role physicians play in identifying measles in patients with clinically compatible symptoms who have recently traveled abroad or have had contact with travelers.

> Measles is characterized by a prodromal phase consisting of mild to moderate fever, cough, runny nose, red eyes and a sore throat occurring 7 to 14 days after a person is infected. Two to three days following the onset of these symptoms, tiny white spots may appear inside the mouth (Koplik's spots). Three to five days after the onset of prodromal symptoms, a red or reddish-brown rash appears, typically beginning on the face at the

hairline and spreading downward to the neck, trunk and upper and lower extremities. Upon appearance of the rash, fever may spike to more than 104 °F.

The case in Kent County occurred in an unvaccinated infant who traveled to an area of the United Kingdom known to have current and recent measles cases. The child developed cough, nasal congestion, decreased oral intake and a fever approximately one week after returning home. To complicate matters, the patient was diagnosed with an ear infection and began antibiotic treatment around the same time as the onset of these symptoms. The patient developed a rash two days after symptom onset, but because of the antibiotic treatment, it was considered to be an adverse reaction to the medication. The patient's fever increased to 104 °F and the patient was admitted to a local hospital overnight for observation and rehydration. A specimen collected two days after the patient was discharged was positive for measles IgM.

Due to the highly infectious nature of measles, it is critical that control measures are implemented immediately upon identification of a suspect case. In hospitals, suspected case patients should be placed in respiratory isolation from the onset of cough in the prodromal stage through the fourth day of rash. Ideally, susceptible contacts should be given live virus measles vaccine within 72 hours of exposure. Immune globulin (IG) should be used for susceptible household contacts with high risks of complications (contacts under 1 year of age, pregnant women or immunocompromised

persons) within 72 hours for maximal exposure, but can be given upwards of 6 days after exposure.

By the time the case of measles in Kent County was confirmed, the time frame for vaccination/provision of IG to contacts had passed. In response to the case, Kent County public health officials contacted over 100 family members, health care providers and hospital contacts to assess vaccination history and instruct contacts on what should be done in response to measles symptoms should they arise. Fortunately, no secondary cases resulted from this exposure. However, national outbreaks in 2011 identified missed opportunities for community control because of misdiagnosis and/or delayed reporting of cases by health care providers.

Although measles is rare, physicians are an important

player in the prevention and control of this illness. Before any international travel, patients 6 months through 11 months of age should have one dose of measles vaccine. Children 12 months of age and older should have two doses separated by at least 28 days. Adolescents and adults who have not had measles or who have not been vaccinated should also get two doses separated by at least 28 days. Travel history should be obtained for all patients presenting with acute febrile rash illness. The World Health Organization maintains global surveillance data which can assist in the identification of high risk countries¹. Early identification and reporting of suspect cases by physicians to the local health department can make all the difference between an isolated case and a local outbreak.

MSU appoints department chairs

We are pleased to announce the appointments of three new department chairs for Michigan State University College of Human Medicine.

> B. Keith English, MD, has been named chair of the Department of Pediatrics and Human Development. Dr. English is professor and associate chair of the Department of Pediatrics at the University of Tennessee Health Science Center, and chief of the Division of Pediatric Infectious Diseases at Le Bonheur Children's Hospital in Memphis institutions he has served for 23 years.

> Charles "Lee" Cox, PhD, PA, has been appointed chair of the Department of Physiology, a department affiliated with MSU Colleges of Human Medicine, Osteopathic Medicine, Veterinary Medicine and Natural Science. Dr. Cox comes to MSU from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. His chief research interest is neural plasticity, which is the brain's ability to adapt to changes in inputs and is essential for brain development and function. A goal of the research is to gain insight into pathological conditions such as epilepsy and Alzheimer's disease, as well as developmental brain disorders such as Fragile X syndrome and autism.

> Richard R. Neubig, MD, PhD, is the new chair of the Department of Pharmacology and Toxicology, a department affiliated with the MSU Colleges of Human Medicine, Osteopathic Medicine and Veterinary Medicine. Dr. Neubig has been a faculty member at the University of Michigan since 1983, where he has served as professor of pharmacology, associate professor of internal medicine, and director of the Center for the Discovery of New Medicines. He is also 2012-13 president-elect of the American Society for Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics, a 5,000-member professional organization.

In other college news, this year 36 students from MSU College of Human Medicine and Ferris State University College of Pharmacy participated in the Engaged Partners Project (EPP), a partnership with Bethany Christian services wherein MSU medical students and FSU pharmacy students are matched with refugee families from areas such as Somalia, Sudan, Liberia and Burma. Over the past several months, the students visited their refugee family four to six times to assess their medical needs, assist with organizing health care appointment dates and present health education workshops.

At the conclusion of the semester, the students delivered a final reflection presentation to school faculty members. Said one medical student, "My experience with EPP has taught me many things that will affect my future practice. I have a better understanding of the complexities to accessing health care and the resources available to people in my community. I am excited to know that I will be better able to serve my patients with the lessons I have learned from my EPP family."

We are excited to continue this collaborative project this fall. Not only is it a good opportunity for our medical students to work across disciplines with other health science students, but is a wonderful way for the students to give back to the community by offering basic health care assistance for international refuges in the greater Grand Rapids area.



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
